The Adult Protective Services Program (APS) of the Michigan Department of Human Services is mandated by law to investigate cases of suspected abuse, neglect, or exploitation for adults, 18 years of age or older. You may call them at their toll-free number above to make a confidential report.

You can make your report anonymously.

#### What is Elder Abuse

Physical: Acts of violence resulting in pain or injury.

Signs include:

scratches

• multiple injuries

lacerations

• favoring areas of body

fractures

· lack of eye contact

Neglect: Failure of responsible person to provide goods or services needed for the adult to function or prevent harm. This includes self-neglect.

Signs include:

· poor personal hygiene

dehydration

· decreased weight

malnutrition

· pressure sores

Psychological: Behavior causing mental suffering.

Signs include:

confusion

fear

· withdrawal

agitation

• depression

· embarrassment

Exploitation: Misuse of the adult's finances and/or assets.

Signs include:

• unusual activity in bank accounts

· hoarding of personal items

• transfer of adult's assets to another • missing valuables/clothing

• substandard care despite adequate

· lack of spending money

financial resources
